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"The themes of trial and tinkering, articulated in the sixth edition of Home Works Forum, were also the binding thread across Ashkal Alwan's various programs in 2013. The concurrence of the forum with Ashkal Alwan's study program allowed HWP participants the opportunity to produce work for Home Works 6, as well as reinforcing the forum's role as an incubator for dialogue and production. Meanwhile, HWP 2013-14 opened up its admissions process, and focused on the importance of self-organization and independent work. This year has thus marked a continued – and continuing – dedication to engaging with young and varied voices, as well as nurturing Ashkal Alwan's sense of collectivity."

The vast majority of Ashkal Alwan's resources in 2013 were directed towards the sixth edition of Home Works: A Forum on Cultural Practices, which took place in May 2013. Home Works 6 resulted in a period of intense energy in the city, with impressive local and international attendance in – and active discussions during and after – lectures, performances, screenings and exhibitions.

Ashkal Alwan also continued its public programming with more than 20 events organized throughout the course of the year. These included film screenings, performances, workshops and other presentations attended by a growing and increasingly diverse public.

Finally, the association developed a number of significant collaborations during the year. In September 2013, Austria-based artist Claudia Bosse was invited for a residency to work on her project *some democratic fictions / Beirut*. Initiated in July 2013, the Beirut Film Station in collaboration with Goethe-Institut Lebanon offers a residency at Home Workspace for filmmakers based in the region as well as equipment for production and post-production.

Ashkal Alwan's major challenge in 2013 was the organization of Home Works 6 – the first time the forum has run concurrently with HWP. Home Works 6 was held in several locations in Beirut from May 14 until May 26; as usual, the spatially dispersed nature of the forum allowed its energy to resonate in different corners of the city, through Ashkal Alwan's collaborations with institutions and venues including Beirut Art Center, Artheum, Al Madina Theatre, Babel Theatre and Metropolis Cinema.

Preparations began early in the year with new members joining the team: Suzy Halajian was appointed as Programming Coordinator at the start of 2013, followed by Reem Akl (Project Coordinator), Mazen Khaled (Film & Video Coordinator), and Alex Paulikevitch (Performance Coordinator).

In addition, the curator of the Home Works 6 exhibition, Tarek Abou El Fetouh, moved to Beirut on a full-time basis in March 2013, and Victoria Lupton was assigned as Assistant Producer. The thematic of the forum centered on ideas of trial, reenactment and tinkerings.

The 2013 forum was in many ways a continuation of the previous editions: it remained a multidisciplinary, international meeting point with a focus on the Arab region; the aim was to encourage dialogue between artists, cultural practitioners and non-artists around contemporary social, political and cultural realities.

However, Home Works 6 also presented a marked change compared to previous editions of the forum. For the first time, several collectives and curators from the Arab region were invited to present projects commissioned by Ashkal Alwan, so that whilst the whole forum was produced by Ashkal Alwan, with Christine Tohme curating the performance, video/film and lecture programs, the Home Works 6 exhibition was curated by Egyptian curator Tarek Abou El Fetouh. the X-Apartments project was presented by Matthias Lilienthal, and the forum also featured multidisciplinary projects over several days by the Lebanese collective 98weeks, and by Zeynep Öz (Turkey). Other collectives invited to present work in Home Works 6 included the Palestinian/British film collective Subversive Films (Nick Denes, Reem Shilleh,

Mohanad Yaqubi) and the Serbian collective TkH Walking Theory (Bojana Cvejic, Marta Popivoda, Ana Vujanovic).

This curatorial decision brought a renewed emphasis to Home Works on younger, dynamic individuals and collectives, and as such marked a movement towards opening up the forum to other curatorial voices and a new spirit of collectivity, paralleling the process of opening which the Home Workspace Program has undergone in the past months.

#### **HOME WORKSPACE PROGRAM**

"From the outset, Home Workspace Program had proposed an 'open' frame-work, where resident professor(s) molded their content with minimal restrictions, and where institution, administration and Curriculum Committee revised and refined the structure as they went along. While such fluidity has meant that with each new edition certain aspects have had to be reinvented from scratch, implicit has also been a resistance to set a fixed template for HWP:

How does one engage with one's context, whether local, political, institutional, or intellectual? How to provide an infrastructure

that is focused and selective, yet not elitist or arbitrary? How can education be public who is the audience?

For Ashkal Alwan, HWP has been from its inception essentially a space and time for inquiry, in a facilitated setting of free tuition and other resources. As the Curriculum Committee prepares its open call to the fourth edition, our priority is to sustain HWP's role as resource, but also as gauge where questions of education in and/or around the arts can be reflected, performed, lived."

#### HWP 2012 - 13

September 2012 - July 2013

Led by theater producer/dramaturge Matthias Lilienthal, the second edition of Home Workspace Program continued with workshops and seminars by Harun Farocki, Stefanie Baumann, and Lina Saneh. The second year built upon the previous one by increasing the opportunities for participants to share their work with the public, and encouraging an informal framework for presentations that emphasized process and ongoing research over end result. Participants worked with Lilienthal on individual and collective projects and on exploring new 'formats' for thinking about and presenting work, in addition to meeting with local artists and mentors for one-on-one and group critiques.

In May, as the prologue event of the Home Works 6 forum organized by Ashkal Alwan, Lilienthal and the program's 14 participants presented the intervention *X-Apartments*, where, equipped with a map and directions, an audience of two people at a time set out on a tour of private homes and businesses in the Beirut neighborhoods of Khandaq Al Ghamiq and Bourj Hammoud. Alongside the 13 different projects by HWP participants, *X-Apartments* included two projects by guests Phil Collins and his students from the Acad-

emy of Media Arts Cologne, and ran for five days from midday to evening.

The rest of the month was spent attending the forum's many events and activities. By June, participants were resuming their studio work for the last stretch of the program, wrapping up in July with a three-day open studios presentation of projects and worksin-progress—diverse in practice and level of accomplishment, yet notably linked together by a consideration for format, and a marked presence of performance and performative elements, text and writing.

"Most importantly in these 11 months, a strong dynamic was built between us, the participants, Matthias, Ashkal Alwan and the city, as each one of us was trying to defy their own practice while better understanding others'. We met, conversed, danced, disputed and contended against difficulties together. As I see it now, we were continually rehearsing a certain collectivity, a one stubborn body that coalesced in some moments, grew apart in others yet never failed to recuperate in silent collaborations. It is still ongoing."

#### HWP 2013 - 14

#### November 2013 - July 2014

In parallel to the ongoing second edition, preparations for the third edition launched in January with the open call for applications to HWP 2013-14, led jointly by thinker/artist Jalal Toufic and artist/e-flux founder Anton Vidokle under the theme of "Creating and Dispersing Universes that Work without Working". In March, HWP's Curriculum Committee, inspired by the content of applications received as well as by the themes proposed by Toufic and Vidokle, took the decision to open up admissions to the program for the third year: anyone wishing to participate in HWP 2013-14 would be welcome to register, whether they had applied during the open call or not. As such, the structure was revised to allow participation in individual workshops and seminars, or in any or all of the year's five chapters, while a large part of the programming would be open to the public without registration—and subsequently a second open call was launched in May.

While at first this move was met with mixed responses from those who had applied in the first round, the overall response has been very positive, with to date over 150 local and international participants enrolled in the various activities of the program—many of whom had applied in the first round—and more incoming requests as the rolling registration continues.

The opening of HWP 2013-14, initially scheduled for September, was postponed due to regional political instability, and subsequently opened on November 6 with an orientation meeting, attended by 50 participants. The first chapter ran until December 20 and included Jalal Toufic's weekly seminar *Creating and Dispersing Universes that Include Mortals*, the educational exhibit *Adam Curtis: the Desperate Edge Of Now*, organized by Anton Vidokle, and workshops, public

talks, and screenings by Brian Kuan Wood, Hans Ulrich Obrist, Marwa Arsanios, Roy Samaha, Mohamed Soueid, Oleksiy Radynski, Ghassan Salhab.

Over the first weeks, the number of participants continued to fluctuate as some left or dropped out and new people joined, especially from the local community. In addition, several self-organized presentations, meetings and reading groups were initiated by participants in parallel to the programming, both at Ashkal Alwan and in other venues throughout the city.

"It's an exciting time to be a part of a program and space that has produced much substance capable of thought as well as facilitated a few of my favorite artistic practices from the Lebanese community. It felt imperative for me to visit Beirut at a time when a certain generation has helped create the foundation for more stimulating practices that resonated with myself as an artist and individual. I had drawn many imaginary parallels between the current throb of activity (in the artistic realm as well as political) in Beirut and back home, in Pakistan, as a basis to understand the growth of what appears to be a highly developed and unrelenting discourse in the arts. Suffice to say, it is proving to be expectedly enlightening.

The barrage of information, rich culture and not to forget, managing everyday existence has become relatively easier to conduct over the last few weeks knowing that the program provides adequate intermittent spaces between activities. The mix of artists, writers, curators and even a doctor or two [among participants] has enriched the experience of being part of this program."

Ashkal Alwan's fourth edition of Video Works scheduled for 2014 was announced in mid-June with an open call for applications.

Applications were open to all genres of video and non-feature-length film proposals (including experimental video, fiction and documentary), provided that the produced works can be screened in a single-channel version.

51 applications were received and six projects were selected by a jury consisting of Carine Doumit, Rima Mismar, Ghassan Salhab and Roy Samaha.

#### The selected grantees are:

Nadine Bekdache and Juma Hamdo Sarah Francis Chloé Griffin Romain Hamard Raed Rafei Jad Youssef

They each receive a production grant of \$5,000, as well as mentorship over the sixmonth production period; the videos will be premiered at Metropolis Art Cinema in April 2014.

Initiated by Ashkal Alwan in 2006, Video Works is a grant and screening platform aimed at supporting the development, production and diffusion of new projects by emerging artists and filmmakers working and/or residing in Lebanon.

### artist residencies

#### **AARON HUGHES**

Ashkal Alwan hosted Aaron Hughes from January 28 to March 29, 2013, as a resident artist researching and developing a short experimental film titled *The Root*. The film explores Lebanese personal relationships with U.S. Marines stationed in Beirut between 1982 and 1984 and the impact of U.S. involvement in the Lebanese Civil War. Highlights of the film include a series of interviews with Abu Ali and Abu Hassan during which they served tea and shared stories about their interaction with the U.S. Marines on their farm in southern Beirut.

Falling in the middle of the 2012-2013 HWP curricular year, Aaron Hughes' residency also provided the ideal opportunity to collaborate closely with several of the program's participants and to participate in its workshops and seminars. He organized a series of social engagements and cultural exchanges including BBQs based on regional recipes from HWP participants and daily teatime discussions.

As an American veteran of the Iraq war, Hughes' practice since 2009 has revolved around and often stems from participatory discussions held in various locations in the context of a traditional tea ceremony. During his time in Beirut, Hughes arranged almost daily afternoon tea ceremonies, encouraging those present at Ashkal Alwan to share their thoughts over tea. Hughes forged a particularly close relationship with HWP participant Raed Motar (Iraq), and the two artists organized the event *TEA* in Home Workspace on March 19, 2013, inviting people to sit and share tea with them and marking the tenth anniversary of the invasion of Iraq:

"The TEA performance was a unique rendition of my ongoing TEA project which began in 2009 and facilitates a diverse dialogue over the sharing of tea that allows participants and the artist to confront difficult sub-

jects and function as a reminder of a shared humanity that is so often overlooked."

The project was presented as a discussion and performance facilitated by the artists. Hughes' residency in Beirut made a remarkable impact, both on the Ashkal Alwan community in terms of the frequent activities and collaborations he arranged with HWP participants, and on his own practice. Indeed, Hughes felt embedded in the local community to such an extent that he independently located the funding to return to Beirut in May 2013 and participate in Home Works 6, Ashkal Alwan's forum on cultural practices:

"During my two months of exploring the connections between my identity as a westerner (white, male, U.S. citizen, and U.S. Army veteran who served in the illegal occupation of Iraq), my artistic practice, and the history of Beirut, I learned that holding and sharing these interests, anxieties, and resulting questions within my practice is more valuable than answering these questions through my work. I am walking away with only more questions and ideas on how to constructively hold these questions in my practice."

Hughes was hosted in an apartment in Beirut, and was provided with accommodation, a monthly stipend and a return flight from the United States.

### artist residencies

#### **BEIRUT FILM STATION**

The Beirut Film Station residency program was initiated in 2013 by Goethe-Institut Lebanon in collaboration with Ashkal Alwan. The program is designed to support young filmmakers from the Middle East and North Africa by providing technical equipment and a workspace, a monthly stipend, travel and accommodation in Beirut in which to develop their projects. Along with this support, the program aims to set up a platform for filmmakers to network, exchange and have exposure to other filmmakers from the region.

An open call for applications was diffused in August 2013 and over 100 applications from around the region were received.

A first round of filmmakers were selected for a trial two-month residency starting in October 2013. During this time, Sarah Nihme (Lebanon), Raed Rafei (Lebanon) and Raed Zeno (Syria) worked in one of Ashkal Alwan's auditoria, furnished with materials from Goethe-Institut.

The 2014 Beirut Film Station residents were selected by a jury comprising Ali Essafi, Birgit Kohler, Hala Lotfy, Talal Al Muhanna and Mohammed Soueid, who met in December 2013 and selected the following 11 residents:



#### **MULTIMEDIA LIBRARY**

In 2013, Ashkal Alwan's public library consolidated its position as a crucial space in Lebanon and the region for researching contemporary art and related subjects. The library includes a growing collection of over 3,000 specialized books and e-books, as well as a collection of videos and film material that was partially digitized in 2013 and is available for consultation on the library's computers, allowing an easy and more secure access.

#### **PUBLISHING**

In the context of Home Works 6, Ashkal Alwan published two publications during 2013, The Islam of Sacred Law and The Islam of State by Waddah Charara, which is available for free download on Ashkal Alwan's website, and ressentiment, a collection of poems by Adel Nassar, selected and translated by Walid Sadek and that was launched on May 25.

#### **CURATED PROJECTS**

Parallel Modernities: On Some Travelling Agendas of Late Modernism in the Shadow of the Cold War 1960s - A Sweet Sixties Conference

"Parallel Modernities" was organized by Sweet Sixties in collaboration with Ashkal Alwan from January 28 until January 30, 2013. With over 20 participants presenting a series of talks, artist presentations and panels, the three-day conference was open to the public, whilst remaining an intimate and in-depth conversation. The themes developed during the conference revolved around the land-scapes and cities of the 1960s, highly influenced by the spirit and forms of Modernity:

"During the 1960s, the landscapes and cities of protectorates and former colonies from India to the Maghreb, from the Soviet Republics to the new states in the Southern hemisphere, are replete with the spirit and forms of Modernity. Forms that transmogrify, and then dissolve into the thin air of

the vernacular... The stories and spirits of a parallel avant-garde, whose silhouettes have yet to be found on the walls of the western canon, are the theme of this conference."

### PRODUCTION FACILITIES & GRANTS

some democratic fictions / BEIRUT

some democratic fictions / BEIRUT was a project developed by Claudia Bosse in collaboration with Günther Auer during her three-week research residency in Ashkal Alwan from October 7 until October 31.

The project resulted in the installation thoughts meet space / BEIRUT co-produced by theatercombinat (Austria) and supported by BMUKK (Austria), which was presented in the multipurpose room at Ashkal Alwan from October 23 to October 29.

During the artist's time at Ashkal Alwan, local people were invited in a series of recorded interviews to share their thoughts about political and social realities – on a possible vision of the future, ways of living, the definition of democracy, and ideas of political change in Beirut and Lebanon.

thoughts meet space / BEIRUT marked a step in the open-ended project Katastrophen 11/15, which in several stages and formats focuses on socio-political events from 2011 to 2015 and reformulates them in installations, performances, choreographies, laboratories, conferences. The installation provided access to parts of the existing some democratic fictions archive, as well as sound and video recordings created and collected in the artist's three-week period at Ashkal Alwan

### PUBLIC PROGRAMMING & WORKSHOPS

Throughout the year, Ashkal Alwan maintained a varied public programming in addi-

tion to the Home Works 6 events. In October 2013, the association hosted a full program of events in parallel with HWP's 2013-14 curriculum.

Ashkal Alwan's public events are free and open to all, and 2013 attracted a large and growing audience consisting mainly of the local community as well as international visitors.

Ashkal Alwan also invited Tarek Atoui and Hu Fang to give a 5-day sound wokshop from December 7 until December 11, inviting 10 participants to work closely with the artists, taking the gardens of Beirut as a case study to look into and work from.

"In November 2012 in Guangzhou (China), Hu Fang and Tarek Atoui initiated a conversation on the notion of collective instruments that elaborates on Atoui's work around this idea at dOCUMENTA (13).

Each found the other in search of new ways and modes of listening, sharing and collaborating; this conversation led them to take the notion of place as a starting point for thinking around and conceiving such models and strategies.

How can we find a way to transpose our relation, experience and perceptions from the encounter with these gardens into soundmaking, composition and performance?

How can elements such as the circulation of water, air and human beings, the lifecycle of vegetation, the consistency of the soil as well as other observed elements lead to sound awareness, score-writing and collective performance?"

#### **CAFETERIA**

Ashkal Alwan's cafeteria was built in 2012 with the primary aim of serving affordable food to HWP participants and Home Workspace visitors, in order to facilitate the association's development as a hub for artistic and intellectual practices in the region. In 2013, Ashkal Alwan decided to self-manage the cafeteria: Fatme Al Halabi was recruited as its supervisor, offering snacks, drinks and a hot meal twice a week.

The space

In 2013, Ashkal Alwan initiated a collaboration with the Beirut/Paris-based web development and design company Keeward. Keeward designed and set up Ashkal Alwan's new website – and other web platforms including an online payment gateway and updated newsletter – in May 2013, as an in-kind support for the association. These new online platforms proved invaluable in disseminating information about Ashkal Alwan's full programming during Home Works 6 and in the 2013-14 edition of HWP.

Ashkal Alwan's team grew significantly in 2013, with the appointment of Amal Issa (previously Assistant Director) as Home Workspace Program Director, as well as the recruitment of Rewa Baassiri, Marie-Nour Héchaimé and Nisreen Kaj over the summer.






#### CHART 1 | GENERAL INCOME 2013




#### CHART 2 | OPERATIONAL BUDGET EXPENDITURE 2013




#### CHART 3 | CAPITAL BUDGET EXPENDITURE 2013
